house plants and how they help the environment. They remove around 95% of toxins from the air around them in 24 hours.

Spider plants and peace lilies specifically are very good at this. As a result the eco council thought about planting one for every class and encouraging them to look after it and help it grow.

So, a few weeks ago, they planted some in pots and brought them around the school to each class.

This is how you look after yours:

- Make sure it is somewhere bright but not in direct sunlight or near drafts.
- Give your spider plant water about once a week.
- Once you have watered it, make sure the top layer of soil is dry before giving it more water.

And that's it - easy right!



Strictly for Come Dancing fans



For all you budding dancers out there who have been hooked on Strictly Come Dancing—here are some fun dance facts for you.

The Tango is a dance with a partner that originated in the 1880s along the Río de la Plata, the border between Argentina and Uruguay. The tango was born in the poorer port areas of these countries.

The Cha – Cha – Cha is a dance from Cuba. It is a Latin dance and was

originally danced to music from Latin composer and violinist Enrique Jorjrin. It was first danced in 1953.

The Pasodoble means *double step* in Spanish and originated as a fast-paced Spanish military march. Its speed allowed troops to go from 60 steps per minute to 120 steps - hence its name. This military march gave rise recently to a modern Spanish dance and a genre of instrumental music often played during bullfights.

The Quickstep like many ballroom and Latin dances began with working people in poorer areas innovating and experimenting and so it had no formal definition, it was loose and care free. The core of quickstep comes from humble beginnings: dancehall bands would often speed up an older version of the modern foxtrot. As the immigrant communities of New York began to love this new dance, it eventually found its way onto public stages

and glamorous ballrooms.

There we have the origins of just a few of the dances on Strictly we see every week.

We are very excited about the grand final on Strictly this Saturday 16th December.

Oaty Fruit Crunch

320g oats

320g plain flour

320g butter (unsalted)

280g sugar

1 tin apples (or fresh)

1 tin strawberries (or fresh)

Mix all ingredients together except the fruit. Press half the mixture into the tin as a base. Spread the fruit on. Sprinkle the remaining mixture on top.

Cook for 30mins at 160c.

It is called ethyl formate.



Because polar bears are an endangered species we thought we would help to inform you and give you some interesting facts.

- Polar bears are considered to be a vulnerable species because of climate change.
- The sea ice habitat on which they depend melts earlier in the spring and forms later in the autumn requiring them to live longer on land.
- Polar bears are the largest species of bear

and land carnivore.

- Polar bears can weigh between 300-800kg, the same weight as a giraffe.
- Polar bears live in Arctic regions like Canada, Alaska, Russia, Greenland and Norway.
- Polar bears can live up to 20 or 30 years.
- As polar bears spend more time onshore, they come into contact with humans more. Unfortunately, this sometimes ends badly for humans and

bears in Russia, Alaska, Greenland, and Canada.

- Keeping polar bears separate from people is better for both, since polar bears that wander into communities pose a risk to people, and



people often respond by killing the bears.

Let's hope things improve for polar bears.

Christmas traditions from around the world

In this article you will learn about some international festive traditions that you may, or may not have heard of.

First we start with some Spanish traditions.

Christmas starts on December 22nd and ends on January 6th. On New Year's Eve, people eat 12 grapes on the last 12 seconds of the year to guarantee good luck for the coming year. You wait for Tio de Nadal instead of Santa.

Now it is time to learn about some Portuguese traditions.

Portuguese families gather on the night of December 24th for dinner, in which the traditional dish is boiled cod or octopus cooked with potatoes and Portuguese cabbage. On December 25th, the tradition is to have stuffed turkey.

Next we travel to France.

In France, Christmas dinner might feature a variety of foods including oysters, foie gras, roast meats like duck or turkey, and a range of cheeses. Dessert often includes a traditional Yule log cake called "Bûche de Noël."

Now we're off to Iceland.

Most Icelanders celebrate Christmas Eve with an impressive home-cooked, multi-course dinner with family. After dinner, people open their presents. After opening the presents, some people go to a midnight Mass, where they meet their neighbours and friends.

Italy next.

In Italy they celebrate the Feast of the Seven Fishes on Christmas Eve. The feast includes seven or more traditional fish and commemorates the wait for the midnight birth of baby Jesus.

La Befana is an elderly woman who visits children on the eve of Epiphany - the night of January 5th - and leaves them gifts.


In Australia Christmas is very different as it happens in the middle of Summer. So eating prawns, having a Boxing Day barbecue and street parties is the norm.

Some American traditions.






Cartoon By Logan and Steven in Owl Class








